As part of the 2025 Membership Drive, the Class A members will pay \$170 a month, which includes a golf cart but no kitchen/bar minimum or voting rights for one year.

Junior members pay on a sliding scale based on age while corporate members pay \$155 per person with the minimum of three employees plus kitchen/bar minima and cart fees.

In other action, the board:

■ agreed to go back to cash purchases in the Pro Shop once the staff is trained on how to handle daily receipts. Numerous members complained about not being able to pay cash for Pro Shop items

■ discussed interviewing four candidates for the club's bookkeeping position vacated by Elizabeth Daugherty, who resigned.

■ heard that members will be assessed \$100 for the driving range and \$40 for Chicago Golf District Association handicap services.

Registration for Men's and Women's Leagues is under way.

Women will hold a signup kickoff meeting 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 16, in the dining room.

The Men's League plays at 5:30 p.m. Tuesdays, beginning April 22 and running 16 weeks.

Four players are on a team, broken down by A, B, C and D players. The

four golfers are divided into two teams that play against another two-man team each week.

Cost for the league is \$65, which includes weekly Pro Shop prizes, league banquet, awards and raffle prizes.

Minimum number of golfers needed is 72 with a maximum of 88.

Women have until Sunday, April 27, to sign up. League play begins April 30.

Lady golfers have a choice of golfing in the scramble league, which plays a two-person, ninehole scramble format at 5 p.m. every Wednesday with a shotgun start Or they can play in the traditional league with two-person teams playing a nine-hole format, beginning at 4 p.m. every Wednesday.

Entry fee for either league is \$50 per player, which covers weekly Pro Shop prizes. League banquet and awards.

Lady golfers who miss the kickoff meeting can call the Pro Shop and be added to the sign-up list.


