## President, four directors will be elected Oct. 20

Election of a new president and four members of the board of directors will take place Oct. 20 at the Annual Meeting of the membership.

All five candidates are running unopposed so the election will be held at the Annual Meeting with Class A and Senior members present voting.

Last year four candidates ran for three positions on the board, creating a contested election and ballots were sent out to Class A and Senior members who could vote by mail or in the clubhouse.

This year, John Ryan is

running unopposed for a two-year term as president. Katrina Butler, Dana Ringuette and Jan Ziebka are running for re-election to three-year terms on the board. And Bernie Buttram was nominated to fill a twoyear term on the board, created by the resignation of Jim Hickenbottom.

The Nominating Committee selected Buttram over Andrew Shick. Both had put their names in the running after the board extended the deadline to file from Aug. 31 to Sept. 30. The bylaws set no provision for a candidate to petition to be put on the

Gayle Bower has seen a lot of changes at the club since 1958, but she says one thing has stayed constant – it still has a "very friendly atmosphere."

"It was like that when we began and it has remained that way over the years," she says.

Bower has been a member at the club for 64 years. Along with Norma Select, they are oldest continuous members at the club.

Gayle and her late husband, J. Leeds "Bud" Bower, joined the club shortly after Bud joined the law firm of H. Ogden Brainard, a longtime member and past club champion.

"Ogden wanted us to be members right away," she says, although she doesn't remember the exact date they joined.

When she joined, she said, the nine-hole course was contained between Country Club Road and the clubhouse. She said she remembers when the clubhouse burned down in February 1959.

She said members started the club again with just a Pro Shop until the current clubhouse was built.

"The new clubhouse has been modified and changed and it now has a beautiful view of the course," Gayle said.

## Wohlstein loved outdoor setting of club

Ron Wohlstein, 77, who loved golfing and being in the beautiful outdoor setting at the club, died Sept. 12 at Sarah Bush Lincoln Health Center, following a fall.

"Ron reintroduced me to golf when I retired, a layoff from the game of some 50 years," said Jeff Lynch, a former club member. "We thoroughly enjoyed playing, but it was more about being in a beautiful outdoor setting on a mid-morning, solving the world's problems and laughing/swearing at our frequently horrible shots."

Lynch said Wohlstein was a "dear, generous and loyal friend," who he met when they both started teaching at Eastern – Wohlstein in the sociology department and Lynch in

the English department. They enjoyed golfing to-

gether, even if they did not enjoy the golf at times.

"We cherished the pars, almost never birdied, but none of that mattered," Lynch said. "It was the company that mattered and the lunch afterwards." In recent years, the Wohlsteins often lunched

Wohlsteins often lunched in the clubhouse with Ed and Nancy Marlow.

Born Sept. 19, 1944, at Schenectady, N.Y., he was the son of Frederick Wohlstein II and Ellen (Sheward) Wohlstein.

He married Vonice Hanson in June of 1966. She died in 1995. He later married Donna Marie Ferguson in July 2003. She survives.

Other survivors include one daughter, Ronalee Wohlstein and spouse Jerry Hayes, of Charelston; several nieces and nephews. His parents and one brother, Frederick Wohlstein III, preceded him in death.

A retired sociology professor, Wohlstein belonged to the Wesley United Methodist Church. He was active with the Charleston Food Pantry, the Coalition for People in Need and Habitat for Humanity. He was a past president of the Coalition Against Domestic Violence and served on the Coles County Sheriff's Department Merit Commission.
